The 2025 J/22 Worlds in Naples came to a close after an intense week of competition, with nine races completed in a wide range of conditions — from light morning airs to steady south-westerly sea breezes and strong north-easterly Grecale gusting up to 25 knots. Throughout the week, the Bay of Naples displayed its full range of moods: bright days with summer-like temperatures and sparkling sunshine alternated with cloudier skies and even one day of heavy rain, when racing went ahead in challenging but manageable conditions. The variety of wind, weather, and sea states provided a complete test of skill and endurance, perfectly capturing the versatility that defines the J/22 class.

Fraporita, the multiple-time J/22 World Champion, once again demonstrated remarkable consistency and control to claim the 2025 world title. Behind them, the two teams from Hamburg — Jola and J-Bender — secured second and third place respectively. The best Italian performance came from Platamonia of the Lega Navale Italiana Napoli, finishing just off the podium in fourth, while Water Lely/TU Delft from the Netherlands rounded out the top five.

### FOUR NATIONS, ONE PASSION



With teams representing the **Netherlands**, **Germany**, **France**, **Portugal**, and **Italy**, this edition of the Worlds reaffirmed the international appeal of the J/22 class. The fleet brought together an inspiring mix of youth and experience — from university students making their debut at an international championship to veteran sailors with decades of racing behind them. This intergenerational blend fostered both competitive spirit and a strong sense of camaraderie, on the water and ashore — a fantastic achievement, even compared to many past J/22 World Championships.











### THE RISE OF THE ITALIAN J/22 FLEET

The 2025 J/22 World Championship in Naples concluded with competitive racing, strong international participation, and a clear sense of shared enthusiasm. Just a few years ago, there were no J/22s racing in Italy. Today, the national fleet counts 15 active boats and keeps growing — proof of the enthusiasm and teamwork that have built a vibrant new sailing community from scratch — the result of dedicated teamwork and passion. The week in Naples not only crowned new champions but also celebrated the growing unity and vitality of this one-design community, setting a high standard for the events to come.

#### PRECISION AND PROFESSIONALISM

**The Race Committee** was outstanding — reading the wind perfectly, setting the course as soon as the breeze stabilized, and even adjusting marks during the final leg to keep the racing flowing smoothly.

The Race Committee, praised by several crews for its "precision and professionalism," managed each transition with efficiency, ensuring fair and timely starts despite rapidly changing wind patterns. From tactical light-air contests to high-adrenaline downwinds in stronger breeze, the competition demanded adaptability and technical skill from all crews.

While the atmosphere ashore remained relaxed and friendly, competition on the water was intense. Close mark roundings, tactical duels, and several photo-finish arrivals kept the pressure high throughout the week. A number of protests were filed to the **International Jury**, underlining both the high level of racing and the determination of the crews to sail by the book. The Jury's prompt and transparent decisions were appreciated across the fleet, reinforcing the spirit of fairness that defines the class.





A huge thank you to Raffaele and the harbour logistics team, who ensured that every launch, haul-out, and docking went like clockwork. Their help and friendliness made life ashore just as enjoyable as the sailing itself.

### THE TASTE OF NAPLES

Every afternoon, after racing, sailors were greeted with pasta, local wine, and homemade cakes — the perfect recipe for recovery, laughter, and storytelling. The spirit of camaraderie thrived onshore, and friendships grew stronger with every glass of wine shared under the Neapolitan sun.

#### **RACING IN A DREAM**

To sail in the same waters that will host the 2027 America's Cup is already special — but when the course is framed by Vesuvio, Capri, Castel dell'Ovo, and the entire natural amphitheatre of the Gulf of Naples, with dolphins joining the fleet, it becomes unforgettable.

Among those most impressed by the week were the new World Champions, Fraporita, who described their experience as "beyond words." They highlighted the exceptional atmosphere created by the organizers and volunteers, noting that "every effort, every mile to reach Naples was repaid with unforgettable emotions." Reflecting on the shoreside hospitality, they added that the post-race pasta, wine, and cakes and the mid-regatta party full of music and dancing were "the perfect way to celebrate sailing together." For them, competing "in the legendary waters of the America's Cup, surrounded by Vesuvius, Capri, and even dolphins," made the event "pure magic."

A similar sentiment came from the Hamburg Sailing Club crews. Both Jola and J-Bender emphasized not only the quality of racing but also the warmth of the Italian welcome. "You organized everything perfectly." they noted, describing the regatta as marked by "fair competition, ideal conditions, and great fun after sailing." They expressed their gratitude for the hospitality and friendships formed during the week, promising that "this will certainly not be the last time we race in Italy."

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

The front-runners were Jeff Hayden (SSA), Adam Burns (YYC) and leading the pack in first was Travis Odenbach (RYC), keeping the hometown club well represented.



**DAY TWO RECAP:** Winds hovered between 3-8 knots throughout the day. Saturday's opening race was very light and shifty. Then, the breeze picked up to a steadier 6-9 knots, making for a more tactical and enjoyable race. Race Committee tried to pull off another contest but ultimately abandoned as the wind faded again. Brad Julian took bullets in both races to shoot up the leaderboard.

### **Technical Committee Report**

### **Updating our Standards for Major Championship Regattas**

I would like to encourage you to give us feedback or comments. Only by that can we develop the Class in the spirit of our sailors. I am honored to work with all members of the various Committees of our Class to make our Class even better.

Our regatta standards are dated from 1/1/2006 and are not reflecting multiple aspects of the current environment and the sailing organizations.

Therefore there is a clear need for an update. In order to go forward, I suggest to split the current document into two documents.

One document should focus on the organizational topics for Championships e.g. selection criteria and process, schedule of races and prizes, requirements for Jury and Race Committee.

### The second document should define Regatta Regulations and have the following content:

- 1. Intent
- 2. Eligibility and Measurement
- Substitution of Crew and Equipment 3.
- Course length and time limits 4.
- 5. Decision to start a race

### Regarding some particular topics, my initial thoughts are:

to 4 Course length and time limits

- Boats shall sail drop-mark windward/leeward courses, including offset marks and gates.
- Boats failing to finish within 15 minutes after the first boat sails the course and finishes shall be scored time limit expired (TLE) without a hearing.
- The race time per day should not exceed 6 hours.
- to 5 Decision to start a race
- Races shall not be started when there is less than an average of four (4) knots of wind speed over the entire course area (measured over a period of 5 minutes).
- Races will not be started in more than an average of 25 knots.

Remark: the 4 kn and the 25 kn values are defined in the Race Management Policies for World Sailing Events (§ 4.6/ § 4.7). I don't see a reason why we should deviate from that World Sailing Policy (Regulation), even if it focuses on Olympic Classes.

The Technical Committee will prepare a first draft prior to the board meeting in the 1st quarter 2026.

### 2026 J/22 **Midwinter Championship**

at Helly Hansen Sailing **World Regatta St. Petersburg**

Prior to August 2025, there was great excitement within the J/22 Class when the committee were approached by the Lipton Cup organisers requesting that the J/22 be the 2025 design of choice for the event. After many discussions and debates, the approval, with certain criteria to be adhered to, was given. The J/22 Class was introduced to the Lipton Challenge for the very first time, with its presence breathing a huge breath of fresh air into the contest by bringing new enthusiasm, a good-sized fleet and a good mix of youth and experience. All this was the catalyst to ensure that the Lipton Challenge remains the top sailing contest in this country.

The J/22 recognition has been a long time in coming as the Lipton Cup Trustees, in doing their due diligence as they should, chose other Classes and fleets which ultimately did not pass muster, before homing in on the J/22 for the 2025 contest. This was a masterstroke as despite some scepticism, the J/22 outperformed itself in terms of providing some of the closest racing in the contest for many years.

However, the Lipton Deed of Gift does indicate that the Challenge will take place in "deep-sea" coastal waters, so sheltered and inland waters are not an option on which to race.



This ultimately extrapolates to the fact that on coastal waters, winds may at times exceed the Class wind limits, and that all competitors should be prepared and sufficiently practised should strong winds prevail at any time. There was one race in strong winds very early in the contest which resulted in broaches, damage and some shattered egos and dreams! The Lipton Challenge has no discards.

An important factor to remember is that the J/22 Class was the 2025 Lipton Challenge Class of choice, with the Lipton Trustees and organisers setting the rules for racing, not the J/22 Class. However, to ensure no damage was done to the South African J/22 Class, the Trustees elected to require the contest to be run strictly in accordance with the Class Rules as they stand.

The J/22 Class' success as the "Lipton boat" was more because the South African fleet are similar in terms of age, and were all built by two local builders, which extrapolated into good, close and tactical one-design racing.

The Class changed the contest for South Africa's Lipton Challenge Cup as never before, featuring as many as 10 races, Hermanus Yacht Club (HYC) emerged as worthy winners of the contest by simply sailing consistently well in every single one of these 10 races.

### THIS IS HOW THE EVENT PLAYED OUT:

The loud cheers from well-wishers as the HYC team docked at the Royal Cape Yacht Club (RCYC) after the final race with "We Are the Champions" reverberating around the marina proved that their fellow competitors fully embraced this victory as one truly deserved.

Included in the crew led by Calvin Gibbs and Markus Progli were two youth sailors for whom this was their debut Lipton and whom, as they emerge as victors, will be pinching themselves for a reality check for a long time to come. The debutants were James Rae and Scarlet Cilliers, both 16 years old and still at school.

A bonus for the team is that Scarlet has probably become the very first woman winner of this event as, despite scouring the history books, no records can be found to show a woman in a winning crew.








So with just a single race left, it was a case of "all or nothing" to secure victory.

The RCYC team, no doubt fed up with their performance on the penultimate day when they were OCS and only turned back to restart after racing for four minutes, blasted out of the start and led all the way to the finish. This fine victory was not enough as the Hermanus team were next to finish - and with that second spot were able to lift the Lipton Cup in victory.

Sadly for the RNYC team, despite trying everything possible to win, their efforts in the final race saw them finish fifth, and third overall. The winners, Hermanus Yacht Club, have some tough decisions to make for the 2026 contest, particularly in terms of the waters on which they will defend. Saldanha Bay is an alluring option as the waters are generally flat and the wind steady. However that option comes with many logistical problems, so Table Bay may well be the logical option for 2026. Whatever their decision, it will bring a bigger fleet and even closer racing as it's now known by all sailors what it takes to lift the Lipton Challenge Cup in victory.



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
